Dear Ms. Strauss:

This is in regard to a complaint investigated April 16, 2005 by the Washington Humane Society against Ringling Brothers Barnum and Bailey when they were at the D.C. Armory. The complaint stated that a man was seen hitting an elephant on the head and sides with a metal rod. While investigating this complaint the Humane Officer observed seven elephants in an outside area without access to shade or water. All of the elephants were in the direct sun. One of the elephants was chained by the front ankle to a stake in the ground. Upon inspecting the inside housing area for the elephants, the Humane Officer observed chains where, according to general manager Mike Stuart, the elephants are kept chained when not performing or on display in the outside area. Mr. Stuart stated that the elephants spend four to five hours a day outside and are kept chained during the performance except for a 20 minute period at the beginning and end of each show when they are performing. According to these numbers, the elephants spend 17-20 hours a day chained. In addition, a mixed Rottweiler was found tied to a travel trailer.

Be advised that as owner or custodian of an animal in the District of Columbia, you are required to provide the animal with proper food, water, air, light, space, veterinary care, shelter and sustenance, and to protect it from unnecessary suffering. You are also prohibited from Cruelly Chaining any animal. Failure to provide such care is a violation of Title 22, Section 1001, et. seq. of the D.C. Code, entitled "Cruelty to Animals," and is punishable for a fine of \$250.00, six moths in jail, or both such fine and jail term.

Cruelly Chaining is defined as attaching an animal to a stationary object or a pulley by means of a chain, rope, tether, leash, cable, or similar restraint under circumstances that may endanger its health, safety, or well being. Cruelly chains includes, but is not limited to, the use of a chain, rope, tether, leash, cable or similar restraint that:

- 1) Exceeds 1/8 the body weight of the animal
- 2) Causes the animal to choke
- 3) Is too short for the animal to move around or for the animal to urinate or defecate in a separate area from the area where it must eat, drink, or lie down
- 4) Is situated where it can become entangled
- 5)Does not permit the animal access to food, water, shade, dry ground, or shelter, or
- 6) Does not permit the animal to escape harm.



The WHS/SPCA enforces the above mentioned sections of the Criminal Code pertaining to the cruelty to animals. In WHS' visit to Ringling Brother's elephants at the D.C. Armory on April 15, 2005 several violations were noted. The elephants in the outside exercise area did not

have access to water or shade in violation of D.C. Code. The chaining practices used by Ringling on the elephants is also a violation of D.C. Code. The rottweiler was also tied in violation of the law. In light of these violations the Washington Humane Society asks that you review the confinement and care of the elephants and other animals and let us know, before returning to the area, what will be done to ensure that these violations do not reoccur.

By law owners are responsible for providing their animals with the following:

Food — Animals must be provided daily with nutritious food in sufficient quantity. An animal's physical condition is the best indicator of proper diet. If an animal appears underweight, if its ribs are showing, it may not be receiving proper food. A long or ungroomed coat may hide a severely emaciated physical condition.

Water - Animals must be provided clean, fresh water at all times.

Air/Light/Space — An animal should not be confined to a confined to a household object like a radiator. Chaining subjects animals to unnecessary suffering and is, therefore, prohibited - Dogs kept outside should be confined in a securely fenced in yard or pen of sufficient size. Areas where dogs are confined should be free of debris and fecal matter. Litter boxes should be kept dean. A strong animal odor should not be present.

Veterinary Care — Veterinary care must be provided for animals showing persistent symptoms of disease or illness such as vomiting, diarrhea, emaciation, loss of appetite, or discharge from the eyes or nose. An animal that has been injured or appears to be in pain should be provided with immediate veterinary care. Dogs must be vaccinated against rabies and distemper and cats must be vaccinated against rabies. Dogs should wear a current D.C. license on a properly fitting collar. A collar that is too tight can cause severe injury. At least two fingers should fit between the animal's neck and its collar.

Shelter - Animals left outside must be provided with proper shelter. The shelter must meet the following standards.

Weatherproof - Solid construction, no cracks or openings other than the entrance. Wood construction with no metal interior surfaces.

Elevated - The floor must be elevated at least two inches off of the ground.

Protected Entrance - The door must be covered with a flexible flap in cold, windy, or rainy weather.

Bedding - Dry straw, leaves, and cedar chips are acceptable bedding. Rugs, cloths, towels, and blankets hold moisture and are not acceptable bedding materials.

Size - The shelter must be large enough for the animal to stand, turn and lie down comfortably in but small enough to allow the animal to warm the interior with its body heat.

Location - The shelter must be shaded in the summer.

Personality – An animal should not act timid, hand shy, fear human contact, or act excessively aggressive. These temperament problems are indicators of neglect.

Quantity - D.C. law requires that persons owning five or more animals over the age of four months must obtain a hobby permit. Oftentimes, people will "collect" animals and have multiple cats and dogs living in their homes.

Spay/neuter - Spaying and neutering prevents and corrects a number of health and behavior problems associated with sexually intact animals. WHS operates a low cost spay/neuter clinic and will assist you in getting your animal spayed and neutered. Contact the WHS spay clinic at 202-88-ALTER for hours of operation and fee schedule.

If an animal is not provided with proper shelter, food, water, air light, veterinary care or space; if there are many animals in a household; or if an animal is exhibiting temperament problems, <u>PLEASE NOTIFY</u> the Washington Humane Society at 202-BE-HUMANE.
