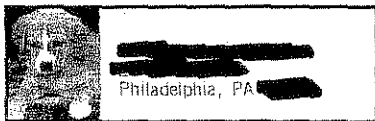

I just had to let you know how very pleased we all were with Mr. Rider when he spoke at our Harrisburg Capital on October 28th.

We took a chance, knowing very little about Tom, but Senator Greenleaf had introduced Senate Bill 453 (banning the bull hook) and we were able to coordinate a date.

We reserved the Capital Rotunda, arranged an appointment with Senator Greenleaf for Mr. Rider, brought a busload of people to Harrisburg and the Pennsylvania Cable Network was there to film activities. We made hotel reservations for our guest for one night only. We carried a very large, very beautiful painting of how elephants should be seen, for that touch of class. With all things go, we held our breath, but all the worry was for naught, Tom was anything but disappointing.

Our meeting with the Senator was at least twenty minutes long and Tom was terrific. I listened closely and was so impressed. Senator Greenleaf asked questions and Tom answered them all. [REDACTED] and I sat in on the meeting but had to say very little.

A podium setup in the Rotunda can be quite intimidating but Tom handled it well and after a talk and a video he fielded a barrage of questions from the audience.

Mr. Rider was punctual, well-dressed, polite, cordial and a gentleman. We were all very proud; he was a wealth of information.

Dear Ms. Meyers:

Last month I had the honor (and I emphasize the word honor) of meeting Mr. Tom Rider in Harrisburg at a rally at the Capitol. A large group of animal activists were meeting with their respective congresspeople in an attempt to persuade them to vote for the proposed legislation that would ban the use of the bull hook on elephants in circuses.

You are very familiar with Tom's work and his dedication of the rest of his life to informing the public about the horrid and cruel treatment of animals used in the circuses. Mr. Rider knows about these abuses firsthand as a result of his employment in circuses. He has been a witness to the injury and indignities being inflicted without mercy upon these innocent animals behind the scenes, and as a result of such observation, abhors the circus and is now devoted to speaking up for the elephants whenever and wherever he can, and indeed, travels extensively to do so.

I had the opportunity of not just listening to his talk, but of conversing with him at lunch. I learned of his lifestyle of traveling in his old dilapidated van to gain venues to talk to people, to spread the word, to teach people the reality of the painful and dispirited lives of circus animals at the hands of their malevolent owners. He has made it his life mission to do this as his attempt at saving future elephants from such hardship. To say that I was impressed by his taking on this project on his own initiative, motivated by the suffering and injustices that these animals endure, is the least of it. I was and still am astounded that such a man can exist, a simple man with no pretensions, no ulterior designs, without greed, and with such utter humility I've never seen before. He is the best illustration of a man who lives according to his beliefs, a man who is true to himself, a pure man. This man, Mr. Tom Rider, has commanded all the respect I can possibly give him. He asks for nothing. He just gets out there and does this work because he believes in it. He is one man, taking on the circus because he believes, because he saw, and because he is not content to allow the abuse and degradation of "his" animals for whom he cared, to continue, if there is anything he can do about it. He saw, and now he is doing something about it. Alone. Without Pay. He didn't even ask for money, but we see his plight, and his sincerity, and his commitment. This man epitomizes goodness, and needs help to continue his work, and anything he receives will be received with the most grateful heart.
