

In 2013, so far...

So far this year, The Humane Society of the United States has played a part in a number of victories for animals, including:

- IHOP's and Applebee's pledge to eliminate gestation crates from its pork supply, adding to a growing list of pledged crate-free companies
- An NIH panel's recommendation to retire more than 350 chimps to a sanctuary
- A federal court's ruling to uphold a puppy-mill law for commercial pet breeders
- The rescue of 25 cats left homeless by Hurricane Sandy
- The rescue of 16 cats from a hoarding situation in a severely deteriorated home
- The Virginia Senate advancing a bill designed to crack down on fox pens
- A federal court's ruling to uphold legislation prohibiting the sale, trade, and possession of shark fins in California

2012 Accomplishments

In 2012, The Humane Society of the United States made so many important strides for animal protection. Take a look at the highlights of what we accomplished, including rescuing exotic animals from a squalid roadside zoo.

Animal Rescue Team saves pets, other animals in crisis

The HSUS Animal Rescue Team helped rescue:

- More than 1,000 dogs from five puppy mills in North Carolina, one in Ohio, one in Mississippi, another in South Carolina, and another in Texas;
- Dozens of dogs from suspected dogfighting operations in <u>Florida</u>, <u>Michigan</u>, and Pennsylvania;
- Tigers, cougars, leopards, wolf-hybrids, and a macaque monkey from the <u>Collins Zoo</u>, an unaccredited Mississippi facility where we had conducted an undercover investigation and submitted legal complaints;
- More than 120 dogs from poor conditions at a commercial breeding facility in Quebec;
- More than 100 parrots and other birds from poor conditions in Ohio;
- More than 380 roosters and hens from a major suspected cockfighting operation in California, and more than 90 birds in Pennsylvania;
- More than 130 dogs, cats, birds, horses, and other animals from poor conditions in North Carolina;
- Nearly 200 dogs from a hoarding situation in Pennsylvania; and
- Nearly 300 dogs from deplorable conditions in Texas.

We also set up an emergency pet shelter and transported animals affected by tornadoes in Kentucky. In the wake of destructive wildfires in Western states, we donated hay to feed hundreds of threatened horses in Colorado, Montana, and Utah; provided food and water to pets left behind in Montana; and helped set up an emergency pet shelter in Idaho. After Hurricane Isaac, we helped care for pets in Jefferson Parish, La., and transported nearly 200 homeless animals from Louisiana and Mississippi to East Coast shelters to be placed for adoption. We also helped rescue more than 20 horses from floodwaters in Mississippi and helped save 10 emaciated horses in Alabama.

Undercover investigations reveal inhumane treatment of pigs, hens on factory farms

- We released an <u>undercover investigation that revealed appalling cruelty</u> at Oklahoma factory farms owned by two of the nation's largest pork producers, Seaboard Foods and Prestage Farms. Our investigation found pigs living in <u>cramped gestation crates</u> for most of their lives, pigs with injuries and abscesses, and dead animals in the crates.
- Our investigative team also exposed overcrowded cages, injured and dead birds, and filthy conditions at a Manheim, Pa., egg factory owned by Kreider Farms.
- We released an <u>undercover investigation of Wyoming Premium Farms</u> that revealed disturbing abuse of mother pigs and piglets, as well as sows suffering in gestation crates. In response, meat industry giant Tyson Foods suspended its purchases from Wyoming Premium.

Proposed rule would protect animals in unlicensed puppy and kitten mills

The USDA announced a <u>proposed rule</u> to close a loophole and require large-scale commercial breeders selling pupples or kittens online to be federally licensed and inspected, which would require basic standards of care. This comes after more than 32,000 people signed an <u>HSUS/ASPCA petition</u> urging the Obama administration to crack down on unregulated mills.

Victories for animals in state legislatures

Here are just a few of the laws to protect animals enacted at the state level in 2012:

- California enacted protections for dogs and wildlife by <u>banning the cruel hound hunting</u> of bears and <u>bobcats</u>.
- Rhode Island passed legislation to phase out the use of gestation crates and veal crates, and to outlaw the tail docking of cattle without anesthesia.
- Ohio restricted the ownership of dangerous exotic animals. This came after the horrible tragedy in Zanesville in October 2011.
- <u>Illinois banned the shark fin trade</u>, building on the laws we've helped to pass in California, Hawaii, Oregon, and Washington.
- Idaho established some <u>felony-level penalties for cockfighting and other forms of</u> malicious cruelty.
- Arizona protected greyhounds by enacting a law that would allow the last remaining greyhound racing track in the state to end live dog racing.
- Minnesota stopped the sale of shelter pets to laboratories. Only a handful of states still allow pets to be seized from shelters and sold to research labs.
- New Jersey banned horse slaughter for human consumption and the transport of horsemeat for human consumption.
- Louisiana stopped the sales of pets from the side of the road. This builds on our efforts to protect dogs from reckless breeders, among other problems.
- New York limited live animal slaughter markets by extending a four-year moratorium forbidding the licensing of new markets within 1,500 feet of a residential dwelling in New York City.

HSUS makes progress against abusive horse soring

- A groundbreaking HSUS undercover investigation documented shocking abuse of
 <u>Tennessee walking horses</u> that led to criminal indictments and public outrage. Our <u>video</u>
 <u>footage</u> documented the painful cruelty of horse soring, as well as animals being shocked
 in the face and beaten with heavy wooden sticks. Trainer Jackie McConnell was <u>fined</u>
 <u>\$75,000</u> and given three years probation by a federal judge.
- The U.S. Department of Agriculture finalized a <u>new rule</u> requiring mandatory minimum penalties for violations of the Horse Protection Act, a federal law to prevent soring. The HSUS and other animal protection and horse groups had filed a petition with USDA seeking to improve enforcement of the law.

• In the U.S. House of Representatives, Reps. Ed Whitfield, R-Ky., and Steve Cohen, D-Tenn., introduced legislation to strengthen the Horse Protection Act and allow for a stronger crackdown on the widespread abuse within the Tennessee walking horse show world.

Leading food companies improve farm animal welfare

In a series of major victories, our farm animal protection division helped many of the world's largest food companies commit to major animal welfare improvements in their supply chains. In 2012, the following companies all committed to eliminate gestation crates from their pork supply chains (with Burger King also pledging to switch 100 percent of eggs to cage-free at all U.S. locations by 2017):

- Restaurants <u>McDonald's</u>, <u>Burger King</u>, <u>Wendy's</u>, <u>Denny's</u>, <u>SUBWAY</u> (with more locations than any other restaurant chain in the world), <u>Wienerschnitzel</u> (the nation's biggest hot dog chain), <u>Dunkin Brands</u>, <u>Brinker International (owner of Chili's</u>), <u>Sonic</u>, <u>Cracker Barrel</u>, <u>Hardee's</u>, <u>Carl's Ir</u>, <u>Baja Fresh</u>, <u>Bruegger's Bagels</u>, <u>Jack in the Box and Qdoba</u>, and <u>The Cheesecake Factory</u>.
- Retailers <u>Kroger</u> (the nation's largest grocery chain), <u>Safeway</u> (the second-largest grocery chain), <u>Costco</u> (the nation's second-largest food retailer), <u>Taraet</u>, and <u>Harris Teeter Supermarkets</u>.
- Food-service companies <u>Compass Group</u>, <u>ARAMARK</u>, and <u>Sodexo</u> (the world's three largest food-service companies that run roughly 20,000 dining operations across North America); <u>Sysco</u> (North America's largest food-service distributor); and <u>TrustHouse Services Group</u>.
- ConAgra Foods, <u>Carnival Corporation</u> (the world's largest cruise company), <u>Hillshire Brands</u> (Jimmy Dean, Ballpark, and Hillshire Farms), <u>Oscar Mayer</u>, and major pork distributor <u>Atlantic Premium</u> Brands.

In addition:

- <u>Bon Appétit</u>, another major food-service provider, committed to phase out eggs from caged hens, foiegras, veal from crated calves, and pork from supply systems using gestation crates by 2015; and
- Pork producer <u>Hormel</u>, maker of SPAM, committed to phase out gestation crates at its company-owned breeding facilities by 2017.

Federal bill introduced to help egg-laying hens

The U.S. Congress introduced <u>bipartisan legislation</u> to codify a <u>landmark</u> <u>agreement between The HSUS and United Egg Producers</u>, essentially doubling the space per laying hen, banning forced starvation molting, and creating a labeling program for eggs.

In 2012, our <u>Animal Rescue Team</u> has saved animals from puppy mills, dogfighting, and other cruelty.

Independent charity evaluator gives HSUS its highest rating

The HSUS received a <u>four-star rating from Charity Navigator</u>, the highest ranking given by the independent charity evaluator.

Our undercover investigations exposed the crueity of gestation crates, horse soring, and other abuses.

Amazon stops selling whale, dolphin meat in Japan after outcry

A report by the Environment Investigative Agency and Humane Society International revealed that Amazon.com's Japanese website was selling products from endangered and protected whale species. After tens of thousands of HSI supporters spoke out, Amazon added an <u>official ban on selling whale and dolphin products</u> on its U.S. and Japanese websites.

Victories for horses and other equines

- The Environmental Protection Agency announced the <u>official registration of the first</u> contraceptive vaccine for horses in the United States, called ZonaStat-H or porcine zonapellucida (PZP). The HSUS sponsored the registration, and the vaccine can now be used by wild horse managers for all Western herds.
- After discussions with The HSUS, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department suspended a
 policy allowing burros in Big Bend Ranch State Park to be killed. We're working with the
 agency to develop a nonlethal plan to manage the animals.
- When the Atlantic City Steel Pier announced plans to bring back an inhumane "horse diving" act, HSUS staff contacted state officials, spoke out against the plan, and applauded the subsequent decision to cancel the event.

110 chimpanzees from notorious laboratory will no longer be used for research

Following a campaign by The HSUS, including a 2009 <u>undercover investigation</u> revealing inhumane treatment of chimpanzees at the New Iberia Research Center in Louisiana, the National Institutes of Health announced that it will move all <u>110 federally-owned</u> <u>chimpanzees</u> out of this facility by August 2013. The agency plans to move 10 chimpanzees to the Chimp Haven sanctuary and about 100 others to a laboratory in Texas, where they

will be classified as "permanently ineligible" for use in research. The HSUS will push for retirement of these animals to appropriate and permanent sanctuary.

Pets for Life program expands to Los Angeles, releases new toolkit and report

Our <u>Pets for Life program</u> providing animal care services to under-served communities expanded to Los Angeles, in addition to existing locations in Atlanta, Chicago, and Philadelphia. Pets for Life also released a <u>new toolkit</u> and a <u>new report</u> of survey findings showing a vast disparity in how pet care services are provided in lower-income communities.

Dead tigers and public safety risks uncovered at exotic animal facility

We released an <u>undercover investigation</u> into one of the largest exotic animal petting zoos in the nation, GW Exotic Animal Park in Oklahoma—a roadside menagerie with no legitimate accreditation. Our investigator found tiger cubs being hit for "training," the breeding of tigers, dangerous interactions between children and juvenile tigers, and more. Five tigers and many other animals died during our investigation, and The HSUS also filed complaints with federal and state authorities.

Court upholds California's Prop 2 to protect farm animals

The U.S. District Court for the Central District of California <u>upheld the constitutionality of Proposition 2</u>—the California ballot measure banning the inhumane confinement of egglaying hens, breeding pigs, and veal calves in cages so small the animals cannot stretch their limbs, lie down, or turn around.

True Religion reaffirms fur-free policy

Leading denim retailer <u>True Religion Brand Jeans has recommitted to be fur-free</u> after HSUS supporters urged the company to reverse its recent decision to begin selling animal fur.

Victories to address issue of dangerous exotic animals

- Ohio Gov. John Kasich <u>signed legislation</u> to ban new ownership of dangerous wild animals in the state. This move to protect public safety and animal welfare was part of an <u>eight-point agreement</u> among The HSUS, leading agricultural groups, and the previous governor.
- The U.S. Department of the Interior announced a <u>ban on the import and trade in Burmese</u> <u>pythons</u>, <u>yellow anacondas</u>, <u>and northern and southern African pythons</u>, after The HSUS and other groups campaigned to regulate the trade in large constrictor snakes for the sake of animal welfare, public safety, and the environment.

Helping to crack down on illegal wildlife trafficking

The HSUS <u>assisted federal wildlife police with an investigation</u>, Operation Cyberwild, that led to the arrest of a dozen people in California and Nevada for illegal online trafficking of wildlife and wildlife parts.

Ban on force-feeding for folegras defended in California

California's law against the sale of folegras from force-fed ducks <u>came under fire</u> from a group of factory farmers and chefs who buy from them, arguing for a repeal, but The HSUS strongly lobbied to defend the ban. State legislative leaders <u>announced</u> that they wouldn't take up any bill advanced by critics of the law.

HSUS videos win prestigious awards

- The HSUS received a 2012 Webby People's Voice Award for our video "Undercover at Smithfield," which revealed appalling conditions for pigs at a Smithfield Foods subsidiary.
- Our Meatless Monday video was named a winner in the 33rd Annual Telly Awards.

AGREEMENT FOR FUNDRAISING SERVICES

Integral Resources Inc. & The Humane Society of the United States

Agreement made on or before February 1, 2013 by and between Integral Resources, Inc., a Massachusetts corporation with a place of business at 1972 Massachusetts Ave. Cambridge, Massachusetts 02140 ("IRI") and The Humane Society of the United States ("HSUS"), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation with an address of 2100 L St. NW, Washington D.C. 20037.

Preliminary Statement

WHEREAS, HSUS, whose mission is to celebrate animals and confronting cruelty and who works to reduce suffering and to create meaningful social change for animals by advocating for sensible public policies, investigating cruelty and working to enforce existing laws, educating the public about animal issues, joining with corporations on behalf of animal-friendly policies, and conducting hands-on programs that make ours a more humane world has agreed to retain IRI to assist if in its doner cultivation and fundraising efforts.

IRI shall, pursuant to The HSUS's Board resolution entitled "A Plan for the Implementation of the Jointly Conducted Activities of The Humane Society of the United States" adopted November 6, 1998, endeavor to contact only those individuals who have a predetermined need or interest in an HSUS program where a program appeal or joint program/fundraising appeal is being conducted.

- A. In furtherance of their mission, HSUS contacts members of the general public in various ways to ask them to assist HSUS in their mission and to seek financial support for their organization.
- B. IRI is experienced in organizing and administering fundraising by telephone to members of the general public on behalf of 501(c)(3) and 501 (c)(4) nonprofit corporations to educate them about their missions and programs, to seek specific action in furtherance thereof and to request financial support.
- C. HSUS desires to retain IRI to conduct by telephone a fundraising program to members of the general public for the purposes described in B above, and IRI is willing to perform such services, on the Terms and conditions in this Agreement.

Terms and Conditions

In consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained in this Agreement, the parties hereto hereby agree as follows:

Section 1. Definitions. As used in this Agreement, the following Terms shall have the following meanings:

- a.) "Contact" shall mean reaching a Member of the General Public in the first instance by telephone who shall make a decision to provide or not provide support to HSUS or who indicates a willingness to consider such support.
- b.) "Members of the General Public" shall mean persons who have not previously expressed an interest in the mission or programs of HSUS and who are deemed most likely to respond favorably to a request for support.
- c.) "Telemarketing" shall mean conducting a Joint Activity in the first instance by contacting Members of the General Public by telephone at their residences.

Section 2. TERM and Services.

- a.) The Term of this Agreement shall begin on February 1, 2013 and shall Terminate on December 31, 2013, subject to Termination as provided in Section 8 hereof.
- b.) During the Term, IRI shall provide the following services to HSUS:

From time to time during the Term, IRI will organize, administer and monitor Acquisition Telemarketing programs on behalf of HSUS, as well as at least one Resolicitation program targeting some of those donors acquired by IRI on HSUS's behalf (generally donors acquired at less than \$50) It is understood between the parties that between any Acquisition program and any Resolicitation program, donors acquired by IRI on HSUS's behalf will be called by another telemarketing firm for the purpose of soliciting a monthly gift commitment or however HSUS deems resolicitation to be viable.

(i) IRI will provide all services required to conduct the Telemarketing programs, including the writing of all scripts, which prior to use, must be approved by the designated staff of HSUS.

- (ii) As to persons who shall make a financial pledge to HSUS during Telemarketing, IRI will provide all services related to the fulfillment of such pledges, including the designing and printing of material and the mailing of the same up to three times to achieve fulfillment of a pledge. The return address for all pledge packets and other material shall be The Humane Society of the United States. 2100 L St. NW, Washington D.C. 20037 or its Arizona Post Office Box. All mail containing funds in fulfillment of pledges are herein called "Returns."
 - (iii) IRI will provide a file to HSUS or its lockbox of all credit card transactions for HSUS to process weekly. All said transaction files will be provided to HSUS in a manner consistent with PCI compliance standards applicable to Level II providers.
- (iv) On a weekly basis, HSUS shall ensure that IRI is provided with information as to which Prospects have fulfilled pledges resulting from IRI's Contacts by providing IRI with a gift file denoting any and all contributions received from prospects who pledged to make a gift when Contacted by IRI. Said information provided to IRI to be as current as possible (hopefully not more than 5 business days from the date the gift is received by HSUS) so that IRI can monitor the effectiveness of the campaign and send out timely reminder notices as appropriate.
- (v) IRI will manage the Telemarketing in its entirety in consultation with HSUS and the Donor Services Group (hereinafter referred to as "DSG,") who for purposes of this Agreement shall assist HSUS in providing general oversight of the program and assist IRI in providing account management of the program to HSUS.
- (vi) Prior to initiating any New Donor Acquisition Program, HSUS will submit its lists of known donors within any state targeted by IRI to InfoGroup. IRI will also submit its lists of prospects from said state(s) to InfoGroup who will conduct a blind confidential merge/purge to ensure that IRI is not soliciting any existing donor of HSUS to become a new donor. InfoGroup will alert IRI if any prospect on IRI's lists should be removed from the acquisition program prior to the start of calling because they are already a donor to HSUS. IRI is not allowed to mark their file with

the information that the person is a donor to HSUS. The costs of said merge/purge shall be borne exclusively by HSUS.

c.) Test Plase. On or about February 1, 2013 and for a period of approximately 90 days, IRI will initiate an initial test of the Acquisition program on HSUS's behalf. This test will consist of approximately 20,000 telephone Contacts (combined between initial and reminder Contacts) to prospects approved by InfoGroup. The initial test program will be conducted in the states of Massachusetts and Illinois only. Pollowing completion of the first 5,000 initial and reminder telephone Contacts, IRI will stop calling while HSUS, IRI and DSG review the results to date. Calling would only continue thereafter if HSUS is satisfied with the preliminary results and authorizes IRI to continue calling. Extending the Acquisition program beyond the states of Massachusetts and Illinois will be decided by mutual agreement of the parties.

Section 3. Fees Psyable to IRI: Billing and Payment.

(a) For each contact achieved during Telemarketing, IRI shall be compensated according to the following:

(b) In addition, all third party charges for credit card processing shall be borne by HSUS.

- (c) IRI shall provide weekly statements to HSUS, which will specify all charges, payments and outstanding balances. All charges by IRI under this Agreement on said weekly invoices shall be paid not thirty days.
- (d) Should the cost of first class postage rise during the TERM, the Per Financial Pledge Package Fee will increase by an amount equal to two and one-lialf times the increment of the postal increase. So if, by example, postage costs were to increase by five cents (\$.05), the Per Financial Pledge Fee would rise by twelve and one half cents (\$.125).

Section 4. Lists: License: Use of Information.

- (a) HSUS grants IRI a nontransferable, non assignable license to use the HSUS name in Telemarketing. IRI shall be permitted to use the name for the purpose contemplated by this Agreement during the Term. IRI acknowledges that the HSUS name is unique and IRI agrees that it will use the HSUS name only in the form and manner prescribed by HSUS from time to time during the TERM. IRI shall not use the HSUS name in connection or association with any mark, logo, design or graphic without written consent. All uses of the HSUS name shall inure to the benefit of HSUS.
- (b) Except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section 4, HSUS shall have all rights to the list or lists of Supporters. Provided that because some such Supporters will be created through the use of lists owned or acquired by IRI, IRI shall retain the right to use the list or lists of such Supporters (created through the use of lists owned or acquired by IRI) for other telemarketing clients and to sell, lease, trade or rent such lists of Supporters at any time, however, no such supporter shall be indentified or purported to any entity other than HSUS to be a supporter of HSUS. IRI shall code any such supporter as simply a contributor to an "animal welfare organization." IRI will not keep or use HSUS provided list or lists of supporters for any telemarketing purposes without the written consent of HSUS. HSUS shall have the sole ownership of Supporters created through the use of lists provided by HSUS.

Section 5. Reports

So long as IRI shall conduct Telemarketing, IRI shall provide daily reports of the results. Such reports shall contain daily and cumulative regarding all relevant information on pledges of financial support and actual contributions along with program costs. HSUS will approve a report sample prior to the initiation of any calling program.

Section 6: Representations and Agreements of IRL.

- (a) IRI represents and warrants that: (i) it is a corporation duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, with full power and authority to carry on its business as now being conducted; (ii) TRI has all requisite power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to perform its obligations hereunder; (iii) All corporate action necessary to authorize the execution of this Agreement has been duly and validly taken; (iv) IRI is duly registered as a professional solicitor. (v) this Agreement has been duly authorized, executed and delivered by IRI and constitutes the valid and binding obligation of IRI enforceable against IRI in accordance with its Terms, subject to (A) applicable bankruptcy, insolvency or other similar laws relating to creditors' rights generally and (B) general principles of equity; (v) Neither the execution and delivery of this Agreement nor the compliance with its provisions by IRI will result in the violation of any laws applicable to IRI or the breach of any agreement or commitment to which IRI is a party or by which it is bound,
- (b) IRI agrees to comply with all of its obligations under applicable laws and regulations.
- (c) IRI represents that it is in compliance with applicable PCI standards relevant to Level II providers.

Section 7. Representations and Agreements of HSUS.

HSUS represents and warrants that: (1) it is a duly organized and valid 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation. (ii) HSUS has all requisite power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to perform its obligations hereunder; (iii) all action necessary to authorize the execution of this Agreement has been duly and validly taken; (iv) HSUS is duly registered as a 501(c)(3) not for profit corporation. (v) This Agreement has been duly authorized, executed and delivered by HSUS.

HSUS-agrees to comply with all of its obligations under applicable laws and regulations.

Section 8. Termination.

Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time by providing the other with forty-eight (48) hours prior written notice.

Section 9. Governing Law. This agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Massachusetts as to interpretation and performance and subject to the jurisdiction of Massachusetts's courts.

Section 10. Complete Agreement. This Agreement represents the complete agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter contained herein.

Section 11. Notice. All notices and other communications required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered by hand or when sent by overnight courier or when mailed, certified or registered mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, and shall be addressed as follows:

Section 12. Indemnification, HSUS shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless IRI, its efficers, employees, and agents from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, including reasonable attorney's fees, or claims for injury for damages caused by or resulting from any breach by HSUS of any warranty or representation made by HSUS in this Agreement.

IRIshall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless HSUS, its officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, including reasonable attorney's fees, or claims for injury for damages caused by or resulting from any breach by IRI of any warranty or representation made by IRI in this Agreement.

Exhibit A. Statutory State Registration Compliance Language

The main Agreement between IRI and HSUS is not a percentage-based agreement and the following language is provided only for purposes of complying with the contract disclosure requirements of the states; set forth below. IRI is to be paid a fixed fee as set forth in the main Agreement. Said compensation provisions shall be controlling. As outlined in the main Agreement, Organization exercises control and approval over the content and frequency of all solicitations. Funds raised shall support HSUS's mission of lighting for the protection of all animals through advocacy, education, and hands-on programs. HSUS rescue and care for tens of thousands of animals each year, and to prevent cruelty before it occurs.

a. For purposes of providing language to comply with the laws of the various states requiring a minimum percentage disclosure, the main Agreement shall be modified to add the following section:

HSUS shall receive a minimum of one percent (1%) of gross revenue.

b. For purposes of the providing language to comply with the laws of the various states requiring an estimated percentage disclosure, the main Agreement shall be modified to add the following acction:

This contract is not a percentage based contract. However, it is estimated that HSUS shall receive one percent (1%) of gross revenue. This is an estimated percentage based upon the estimated number of contacts, average pledge fulfillment and experience of similar campaigns. All financial arrangements as stated in the main Agreement shall remain in effect and unchanged.

c. For purposes of providing language to comply with the laws of the various states requiring a fixed or guaranteed percentage disclosure and/or a percentage which shall be received by IRI, the main Agreement shall be modified to add the following section:

HSUS shall receive as a result of this solicitation campaign one percent (1%) and IRI shall receive ninety-nine percent (99%) of all funds raised. The amount going to IRI is an estimated percentage based upon previous experience of similar campaigns conducted by IRI. This shall not affect or after compensation provisions as provided in the main Agreement.

d. For purposes of the states of Illinois, Massachusetts only, the contract shall be modified to add the following section:

IRI shall be authorized by HSUS to conduct solicitations on a nationwide basis during the term of this agreement. IRI projects \$100,000.00 in gross revenue to be raised from this campaign. IRI estimates expenses related to the campaign to be \$99,000.00. The estimated figures are based upon experience of similar campaigns conducted by IRI. This shall not affect any of the other terms including compensation as set out in the main Agreement. The books and records of fundraising activities shall be kept at the address of IRI as provided in the main Agreement.

2. In all other respects not specifically modified herein the existing agreement dated February 1, 2013 shall remain in full force and effect. A copy of said agreement is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

Further, this agreement may not be modified, changed or terminated in whole or in part, in any manner except by an agreement duly signed by HSUS and IRI.
